

nternational Workers' Day, or May Day, is celebrated worldwide on May 1st every year as an honour to the struggles and victories of workers who worked and sacrificed relentlessly in securing fair rights including the eight-hour workday, safe conditions, and decent wages. Although the historical roots of May Day lie in 19th-century labor movements in the U.S., especially the Haymarket Affair of 1886, it has become relevant across the globe, especially to countries like Bangladesh.

In Bangladesh, May Day serves as a critical reminder of what labourers have to go through, particularly in the RMG sector, which employs millions and contributes to the economy through foreign exports but is plagued by unsafe conditions,

low wages, and long hours. More importantly, disasters like the Rana Plaza collapse in 2013 still echo the harsh realities that inspired May Day's origin. The underline is that May Day aims at fostering unity among workers, encouraging collective action and advocacy to pressurise policymakers for reforms. As Bangladesh's economy relies heavily on labor-intensive industries, the spirit of May Day remains deeply relevant, reminding us that hard-won rights must be protected and expanded.

Lastly, the voices silenced in 1887 still echo today:

"THE DAY WILL COME WHEN OUR SILENCE WILL BE MORE POWERFUL THAN THE VOICES YOU ARE THROTTLING TODAY."

THE DIRE WOLF IS BACK?

INTER IS NOT HERE yet but certainly the dire wolf is. Geneticists at the U.S company Colossal Biosciences stated on April 7 that they "remade" the dire wolf, a species that has been extinct for about 13,000 years. This breakthrough was made possible by using DNA extracted from two dire wolf

fossils, Colossal's team made 20 targeted gene edits to the DNA sequence of a gray wolf,

which shares a common ancestor with the dire wolf. Colossal Biosciences rewrote the genetic code of the common gray wolf to match it, and using domestic dogs as surrogate mothers. Although these three pups resemble dire wolves, they have a lighter coat and larger in size than gray wolves.

Many of us were first introduced to the name "Dire wolf" through a TV series named "Game of Thrones". The DNA experiment later produced three pups named Remus, Romulus and Khaleesi. In Roman mythology, Remus and Romulus were twin brothers who later found Rome. That is where the names of the pups Remus and Romulus came from. And Khaleesi was named after "Daenerys Targaryen" although Dire wolf was the sigil of "House Stark" in the series. However, the pups are now being raised and nurtured in an undisclosed wildlife are in the US to protect the animals from prying eyes.

Rise & Growth of Islamic Financing in Bangladesh

Islamic financing, known as Shariah-compliant finance, is a financial system that adheres to Islamic laws and does not incorporate interests in any of the process of financing and rather focuses on the concept of profit-sharing. The pioneer of Islamic financing in Bangladesh is Islami Bank Bangladesh Ltd. which started its journey back in 1983. Although the current very recent scenario is quite different, as of March, 2024, Islamic banks held 26% of deposits and 28% of investments in the banking industry. The current infrastructure of Islamic financing in Bangladesh includes 10 full-fledged Islamic banks that operate with their expansive 1,672 branches across Bangladesh. Now, the key driver of this sector incorporates mainly Bangladesh Bank's refinance schemes for Shariah-based SMEs. As these Islamic banks specialize in SME banking, the sector has exponentially boomed over the last 5 years. One of the major impacts that Islamic financing has on Bangladesh's economy is rural financial inclusion. From farmers to small business owners, almost all of Bangladesh are connected through 4,000 Islamic agent banking outlets. Again, with FinTech investment platforms such as Biniyog.IO, iFarmer's halal investment schemes being on the rise clearly states the increasing demand of Islamic financing from investor's end in Bangladesh, as well.

BANGLADESH INVESTMENT SUMMIT 2025 UNLOCKING A NATION'S POTENTIAL

Bangladesh hosted the Investment Summit 2025 from April 7–10 at the Intercontinental Hotel, Dhaka, to present the country as a promising destination for global investment. Organized by BIDA and BEZA, the event brought together top government officials, international investors, and business leaders. Before the main sessions, investors visited key industrial areas: Korean EPZ (Anwara, Chattogram), National SEZ (Mirsharai, Chattogram), and Bangladesh SEZ (Araihazar, Narayanganj). The summit officially began with a keynote speech by Nobel Laureate Professor Muhammad Yunus, followed by panel discussions featuring global figures like Baroness Rosie Winterton, Sultan Ahmed bin Sulayem, and Oscar García Maceiras. Breakout sessions covered key sectors such as renewable energy, digital economy and fintech, smart textiles, pharmaceuticals, agro-processing, and logistics. Highlights included a World Bank report launch, a UNDP/ILO roundtable on ethical business, and a fireside chat with DP World. The summit led to \$260 million in new investments and six MoUs, including the Bangladesh—Netherlands Seed Partnership and a NASA collaboration. In response to investor concerns, the government promised a One-Stop Service and faster infrastructure upgrades. Bangladesh is open for business—and ready for the future.

The First FBS-Exclusive Band

In search of food for the soul, five enthusiastic students used to gather to practice music in the FBS Music Wing. For a show organized by DUBS (Dhaka University Band Society), they performed under the banner of a temporary band entitled "TEMPO."

Later on May 17th, 2023—The band "Tempo" was transmuted to **Ants on the Run**, the first fully FBS-homegrown band, with Nandito Banik as lead vocalist, Siam Mahbub as bassist, Safrat Alif and Ahon Aminul as guitarists, and Swatcha Jajong as drummer. As Mahbub put it, they "felt the bond together and the chemistry just clicked." AOTR represents fast-paced lives of the ants on the run for the cause of survival—yet managing to sit back for music, calm and recreation.

The band has two notable original soundtracks—"Baghbondi," regarding the complexities of fractured love, and "Mohanayok," about revolution. They also perform covers of Smells Like Teen Spirit, Bishakto Manush, Ekanto

Golaap, Another One Bites the Dust, and have created their very own fusion of multiple Bangla folk songs. Their music speaks of revolution, anarchy, love, and melancholy, inspired by Queen, Radiohead, Fossils, Nirvana, and Miles. AOTR is coursing through a tough schedule as the band is currently working on multiple tracks to release an album in near future.

The indie rock band has created a space for itself in the campus music scene, performing at FBS Music Wing events like the Falgun Festival and gaining recognition through electrifying performances at the Marketing Golden Jubilee, Rokte Ranga Bijoy Amaar (a Victory Day celebration), the DU 100th Batch Grand Meetup, Concert for the Cold-Stricken, and many more. Banik shared that their most memorable day was performing for a fresher's reception at Govt. Rupnagar Model School & College, then leaving immediately for the Marketing Jubilee, receiving energetic and wholehearted appreciation from both audiences—just like the band's purpose. Mahbub mentioned they were actually on the run, justifying the title "Ants on the Run".

One such story was shared during the Bangladesh Startup Connect 2025, where Shahir Chowdhury, a founder of Shikho, spoke about a student from a remote village in Barishal. With little access to traditional resources. the student used online lessons to prepare for his HSC exams and ultimately earned a place at the Dhaka prestigious Medical College.

This was just one of many stories that reflect a quiet but impactful revolution in our education system. For decades, the system struggled to adapt, leaving many behind, especially in rural areas. But now, with over half of our population under the age of 25, the rise of EdTech is not just welcome, it's necessary. By blending technology with learning, these startups are making education more accessible and affordable to help these ambitious youth achieve great heights.

Yet, the potential of this sector remains largely untapped.

Although part of a \$16 billion

market, EdTech startups have attracted just \$18 million in investments. Our Honourable Education Adviser stressed this gap, urging recognition and support for these innovators. Another prominent startup,10 Minute School, also pointed out how technology can not only educate but also create jobs, helping to address the rising youth unemployment.

Recognition at the summit is a step in the right direction. A future awaits where education will no longer be limited by distance but powered by innovation, equity, and opportunity for all.
